Call for Papers

There are no deadlines in *Translation, Cognition & Behavior*: submissions may be sent **all year round**, although the journal will need to close issues at certain specific times of the year. Candidate drafts need to be **between 6,000 and 8,000 words** long (including references and a 100–150 word-long abstract). The **journal style sheet** may be retrieved from the journal's webpage at John Benjamins website or from the journal's FaceBook page. Authors should contact the journal at editor@cogtrans.net, so as to receive a link to enter the information for the **cover page** directly into the journal's database.

Welcome contributions will report on cutting -edgeresearch focusing on, but not limited to

- Research paradigms in cognitive translation studies, from computationalism to connectionism and embodied, embedded cognition
- Theory, model building, fundamental concepts and constructs involved in the study of cognitive processes in translation and interpreting
- Appropriate qualitative and quantitative research methods
- Cross-language processing and mode differences (writing vs. speech, hearing vs. reading vs. language signing)
- Task-specific processing differences (e.g., in reading, writing, revising, monitoring)
- Mental load and effort, problem-solving, multi-tasking, planning, metacognition and control in cross-language mediation
- Task environment conditions and constraints, and their influence on cognition
- Translation ergonomics, HCI and extended cognition
- Intersection of the individual and the social in cognitive translation research, distributed cognition
- Development and learning of translation and interpreting skills, competence, and expertise
- Interdisciplinary issues and relationships (e.g., to bilingualism research, reading research, writing research)

Also, every other issue will have a thematic section, with three to five articles on a specific topic. Thematic sections in the next issues will be:
